

DEVOTION TO THE SACRED HEART

Devotion to Jesus' Sacred Heart is perhaps the most popular in the Church today, and it had its beginning in 17th century France. In 1672, Christ appeared to a French Visitation nun, St. Margaret Mary Alacoque. Over a series of visits, Our Lord revealed to St. Margaret Mary the importance of devotion to His Sacred Heart. He asked that His Heart, wounded on the Cross and continually wounded by ingratitude of men for His sacrifice for them, be venerated and adored as an embodiment of His Divine mercy and love.

Jesus especially asked that all people go to Confession and receive Holy Communion often, especially on the First Friday of each month, and that reparation be made for sins committed against His Sacred Heart and the Holy Eucharist. He also requested that the Church observe a feast day specifically for the purpose of this reparation. In 1856, the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart was officially added to the liturgical calendar.

You can have a devotion to the Sacred Heart by doing as Our Lord asked, by receiving Holy Communion frequently (especially on the first Friday of each month), monthly Confession, veneration of an image of His Sacred Heart, and prayers and sacrifices offered out of love for Him and for the conversion of sinners.

Jesus also gave us, through St. Margaret Mary, special promises for those who keep a loving devotion to the attribute of His infinite love for mankind as represented in His Most Sacred Heart. Following are the 12 incredible promises of Jesus to those who have a true devotion to His Sacred Heart:

- 1. I will give them all the graces necessary in their state of life
- 2. I will establish peace in their homes.
- 3. I will comfort them in all their afflictions.
- 4. I will be their secure refuge during life, and above all, in death.
- 5. I will bestow abundant blessings upon all their undertakings.
- 6. Sinners will find in My Heart the source and infinite ocean of mercy.
- 7. Lukewarm souls shall become fervent.
- 8. Fervent souls shall quickly mount to high perfection.
- 9. I will bless every place in which an image of my Heart is exposed and honored.
- 10. I will give to priests the gift of touching the most hardened hearts.
- 11. Those who shall promote this devotion shall have their names written in My Heart.
- 12. I promise you in the excessive mercy of My Heart that My all-powerful love will grant to all those who receive Holy Communion on the First Fridays in nine consecutive months the grace of final perseverance; they shall not die in My disgrace, nor without receiving their Sacraments. My Divine Heart shall be their safe refuge in this last moment.



Jubilee of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

To celebrate the Jubilee Year of the Sacred Heart of Jesus here at Our Lady, we will be giving out <u>blessed</u> Sacred Heart badges beginning on Friday, June 7, the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus!

The blessed Sacred Heart badges should be kept on your person if possible: in your wallet or purse; in your car; or in the prayer book that you use every day. This sacramental would be very welcomed by someone who is homebound or ill.

June 7 would be an excellent day on which to begin the **Nine First Fridays devotion** if you are not already doing it. Read the promises above to help you understand how important this is for your spiritual life.

THE EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL IS COMING TO COLUMBUS!

All are invited to join Bishop Earl K. Fernandes and the perpetual pilgrims from the National Eucharistic Process for a week of Eucharistic Revival June 24-30, as they travel through the Diocese of Columbus. Be sure to register today, the local Masses are filling up quickly!

Of the four routes travelling across the country beginning May 17, our route is called the Seton Route which began in Connecticut and will process to the National Eucharistic Congress in Indianapolis, July 17-21. The pilgrims will visit holy sites, embrace the Sacraments daily, and publicly proclaim Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist as they accompany him to the National Eucharistic Congress at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis.

Fr. Roger Landry the chaplain at Columbia University will be leading the Seton Route which is comprised of two priests, one brother, one seminarian, and five young adults. The Daughters of Mary, Mother of Healing Love will also travel with the Seton Route. On Wednesday, June 26, Fr. Landry will celebrate the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood with the Mass at Seton Parish. Join us for this special night to honor him and his vocation!

The Columbus Diocese is on the route named after St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, the first American-born saint to be canonized by the Catholic Church. A convert to Catholicism, the young mother and widow was drawn to the Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. She opened the first Catholic school for girls in America in 1810. Her work laid the foundation for what is now the parochial school system. A relic of Mother Seton from the Museum of Catholic Art and History will be on display at the pilgrimage locations.

NATIONAL Eucharistic Pilgrimage

Plenary Indulgence for National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

A decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary and approved by Pope Francis indicates that the plenary indulgence will be granted to the Christian faithful who participate in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage at any point between May 17 and July 16, 2024. It will also be granted to the elderly, infirm, and all those who cannot leave their homes for a serious reason and who participate in spirit with the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, uniting their prayers, pains, or inconveniences with Christ and the pilgrimage.

This indulgence is granted under the usual conditions of Sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. The faithful may also apply this indulgence through suffrage for the souls of the faithful departed in Purgatory. In recognition of this extraordinary event, the Apostolic Penitentiary also requests that all priests who have been endowed with the appropriate faculties for hearing Confessions present themselves willingly and generously in administering the Sacrament of Penance to all who participate in the

How to Plan a Mini-Eucharistic Pilgrimage!

Sr. Kathryn J. Hermes has the scoop on what it means to make a <u>Eucharistic</u> <u>Pilgrimage</u> and how you can make one on

ONE OF THE LARGEST EUCHARISTIC PILGRIMAGES IN HISTORY

As we enter the Year of Parish Revival, we are preparing for one of the largest Eucharistic pilgrimages in history here in the United States. For two months, women and men will process with the Eucharist across the country, lighting hearts on fire with hope and joy along the way. This demonstration of faith in the Eucharist will take place from May 17 (the weekend of Pentecost) to July 16, 2024.

Commencing from four starting points, Brownsville, TX; Lake Itasca, MN; New Haven, CT; and San Francisco, CA, pilgrims will process with our Eucharistic Lord through cities, along highways, and past rural towns, meeting in Indianapolis just before the National Eucharistic Congress. Along the way, they will be praying, seeking new depths of transformation in Jesus, serving those on the margins, and witnessing to their faith in the Risen Jesus.

I would love to travel with the Eucharist across the country and to witness the marvels of grace that Jesus will pour out upon our nation during this prayerful journey. However, I know right now that I won't be able to be part of the

National Pilgrimage. Probably many of you won't be able to join this amazing Eucharistic event either.

Yet all of us are invited to grow in love for Jesus in the Eucharist and to share our faith as missionary disciples. This summer, why not go on your own Eucharistic pilgrimage right where you live to deepen your Eucharistic faith and devotion?

On a local pilgrimage, you can explore the holy places in your own diocese, state, town, or even your own parish, adoring the Eucharistic presence of Jesus Christ anew and participating in Mass in your own backyard.

A STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE TO PLANNING YOUR OWN PILGRIMAGE

Are you ready to plan a local pilgrimage this summer? To make it easy for you, we have created a simple, step-by-step-guide that you can download today. Here are the most important things you'll want to consider as you plan your pilgrimage:

•Your intention (WHY you are making the pilgrimage)—A local pilgrimage is the perfect opportunity to pray for special intentions that you, your family, and your friends may have. You can carry in your

heart intentions for the Church and the world. Don't forget to pray for the Eucharistic Revival!

•Your pilgrimage destination (WHERE you will be journeying on your pilgrimage)—Check out your diocesan website or town directory. Is there a shrine you have never visited? Is the cathedral close to you? Is there a monastery that would receive your visit to their chapel?

Remember, on a pilgrimage, you are part of the Body of Christ, the Church. Even if you make a pilgrimage as an individual, you are in communion with all the people who have prayed in that pilgrimage spot over the years. In fact, when you are on pilgrimage, you journey with the whole Church—the communion of saints—in Heaven and on Earth. On your pilgrimage expect an outpouring of grace that will rekindle your hope and renew your faith in Jesus in the Eucharist. Know that you will bring back the joy you received on the journey to share as a gift with those you encounter every day.

As did the disciples at Emmaus, and as the holy women and men have done through the ages, we too proclaim the hope and joy our world so desperately seeks. A Eucharistic pilgrimage is a visible and powerful witness to the world that Jesus is here, present in the most Blessed Sacrament, and he accompanies us—all of us—on our pilgrimage through life.



May Crowning 2024


On Sunday May 12, 2024, Our Lady's Annual May Crowning took place following the 10AM Mass. It was a beautiful morning following many days of rainy weather. Fr. Cyprian presided over our devotion.

Line (pronounced as Lynn) Feutseu, from the PSR, was chosen to place the crown of flowers on Mary's statue.

The crown has been provided by June & Joe Hettinger, long-time parishioners. We thank them for this beautiful gift for the Blessed Mother. They are moving to



Johnstown to be near their children and grandchildren and they can no longer attend Masses here at our parish. We will miss them greatly.



Respect for the Holy Eucharist - A Catechesis on the Body and Blood of Christ.

We need some background before we get into the meat of this catechesis!

FAQ: Why does the Catholic Church require the Sunday Mass obligation?

FAQ: What is so special about the Eucharist in Holy Communion?

I want to recall a bit of history to bring this writing to its main point. The first Catholic point we should know is that from the first books of the Bible we learn that humanity cannot have worship without sacrifice! It is part of human nature to worship! A review:

- From the Book of Genesis, Adam (and Eve) was to tend the garden and walk with God in the garden: the beginning of prayer and sacrifice.
- ◆ Cain and Abel the first murder was because of jealousy over the **quality** of sacrifice.
- ♦ In every story of the Biblical patriarchs/heroes we read that sacrifice to God was a necessary and frequent part of life.
- The pagans sacrificed to the gods they invented to control the environment and bring prosperity in their lives and, perhaps, disaster or curses to their enemies!
- ♦ When God gave The Law (Ten Commandments -3rd Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Gen 20:8) to Moses on Mt. Sinai, He was completely specific about how He wanted the Israelites to live and God was even more specific about how they were to perform the worship that He required.
- ◆ Exodus and Leviticus are chock full of prescriptions for daily life and for the Sabbath rest (worship). The first three commandments define man's responsibilities to God!

 Because the Israelites did not follow God's original directions, the priestly function (which God gave them!) of the Sabbath worship was given to the tribe of Aaron and his descendants! In the Mosaic Law, now only the priests could partake of the sacrifice!
- ◆ Recall that after the Tabernacle (tent of meeting) was set up, the Glory Cloud, the Shekinah, descended upon it – and they knew God was present!

Okay, so what does that have to do with the Catholic Church and why we go every Sunday for Mass?

When Jesus fulfilled the Old Law (of Moses) the animal sacrifice was no longer the sacrifice that God wanted. That did not mean that there is/was no longer any need for sacrifice to God! Now the sacrifice is God, Himself, in the Second Person of the Trinity, Jesus! Through every step Jesus made - from the institution of the Holy Eucharist at the Last Supper to the Resurrection (on Sunday), instituted the True, Living Sacrifice for all men, for all time. And He did it (fulfilled it) in such a beautiful way that everyone can be present with Him and share in the Sacrifice and in a priestly role!

How am I priestly at Mass? By my Baptism I am: Priest, Prophet and King (Queen)!

First of all recognize where you are!

- ♦ Just as the Israelites knew that God was in the Tabernacle whenever the Glory Cloud covered the tent, we know when we enter the Catholic Church, Jesus is present in the Tabernacle! We are in His Presence! We feel a Holy Silence!
- ♦ In fully participating in the <u>prayers and the actions</u> of the Sacrifice of the Mass (singing, kneeling, standing, sitting, being silent). Fr. Coleman would say, "Bring the real you to the Real Jesus! At the Offertory when the bread and wine are brought forward <u>your priestly role is to place your life</u>, its miseries and all that you love on the Altar and give them to God!
- ◆ After the Consecration when the priest elevates the Host and the Chalice, he offers back to God, through the Holy Spirit, the living Jesus in the Host and the Precious Blood, AND everything that is on that Altar! We say the Great Amen! So, be it! What did you place there to give to God? Was there any thanksgiving in your heart?

Okay, maybe you were distracted and missed this opportunity; you have another at Holy Communion!

As Catholics we believe that at the moment of death we will meet Jesus and He will judge our lives — or rather, our lives will judge us. You can, in a way, rehearse your death when you receive Holy Communion! As you walk forward to receive Jesus, prepare your heart; give Him yourself and all that you have in thanksgiving for His giving you The Eucharist: His Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity! Communion is a two-way street! You are there to give yourself, not just to receive! What is so special about the Eucharist in Holy Communion? The Second Person of the Blessed Trinity is giving Himself,

completely and unreservedly, to us who receive! Are you paying attention? Did you get what you just read? Did you look at the Host/Jesus when you said "Amen"! Amen means 'I believe' 'So be it'! YOU are receiving THE MOST HOLY SUBSTANCE, THE MOST SACRED SPECIES ON EARTH! Jesus is the Eucharist Species!

To the point of this writing: Respect for the Eucharist

I can hardly write this, but I have to ask: Did you stop in that moment of reception and realize that you are receiving Divinity? Are you paying attention? Did you lose your focus when the Host was placed in your hand or on your tongue? Did Jesus in that Host fall to the floor? In receiving the Precious Blood, did a Drop fall to the floor? NOW WHAT? Don't just walk away!

Special attention MUST to be taken when the Eucharist (Jesus) falls to the floor! We MUST protect that spot where Jesus fell! We must purify that spot by removing the Particles or Drops present there! The server attending the Priest or Extra-ordinary Minister of the Holy Eucharist will place a cloth (purificator)

over the spot. DO NOT REMOVE THE CLOTH! After



Mass the server will return to remove the cloth and dilute the traces of Jesus so that He is not longer there!

TEARS AT COMMUNION!

I would like to share an experience that I had a couple weeks ago here at Sunday Mass.

Some people have asked me why I receive only the Precious Blood at Communion. I have a disease called celiac, from which I consume no wheat, not even the small amount in low gluten hosts. When I go to another church, I cannot receive. I lift it up as a sacrifice when I am not at Our Lady for those who desire to receive but cannot receive due to not being in a state of grace. The Precious Blood is also the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord, under the appearance of wine.

"Eucharist" originates from the Greek word *eucharistia*, meaning thanksgiving. I have the privilege of being an Extra-ordinary Minister of the Holy Eucharist, distributing to souls the Eucharist in the Precious Blood. As I received, I was full of gratitude and I felt this overwhelming sense of thanksgiving for each soul who

came to receive, to the point of tears.

The tears flowed as I said, "The Blood of Christ" to each person. The only thing I felt was thanksgiving for each soul, thirsting for the Lord. Sometimes as I watched how people received with great reverence and care, the tears flowed even more. It was a beautiful experience.

We are given the ultimate gift on Earth of Christ coming and giving Himself to us, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. I am so grateful to be Catholic. I am so grateful that our priests allow me to receive from the Precious Blood, and I am so grateful to be in a parish that loves Jesus so much.

The grace in this Sacrament starts in receiving Christ with love, first we must soak in the grace, and then we must use it! If you know someone who has left the Church, remind them that they walked away from the one true source of pure love in this world in the Eucharist, and invite them to come back.

THOUGHTS FOR MEDITATION!

As a life-long Catholic, I believe life begins at conception. As a practicing Catholic, you believe it. As a good Christian, you believe it. But unfortunately, not everyone believes it. There is a continuing, powerful debate on the issue of abortion that will have a potentially dangerous outcome if we are not careful. The absolute Pro-Life stance is for all abortions to be banned, which is without question the ideal. The Pro-Abortion stance varies from allowing abortion in the first few weeks (the 6th week, by some accounts) to the 9th month. If we Pro-Life advocates set ourselves rigidly at banning all abortions and vote that way, there is a serious possibility that the Pro-Abortion advocates will win on November 5. That would leave the door wide open to late-term abortions. up to the moment of birth - including in some states, partialbirth and post-birth abortions. As painful as it may be, we need to realize that the ideal sometimes cannot be met; so, for now, we need to consider not voting for, but accepting the earliest possible week to permit abortions. Even though it means that some babies may never have a chance at life here on Earth, we can trust that God will never abandon them. They will find salvation in God's eternal love for ALL of His creation – including those whose lives end in the womb. Think about it. Pray about it. Vote carefully about it.
