We remember and honor the saints for their exemplary lives and holiness. We seek their intercession as they watch and inspire us to constantly attempt to embrace the **call to holiness**.




All Saints Day - The Triduum of Saints

In the first ages, during the night before every feast [saint or event], a vigil was kept. In the evening the faithful assembled in the place or church where the feast was to be celebrated and prepared themselves by prayers, readings from the Offices of <u>Vespers</u> and <u>Matins</u> [Liturgy of the Hours], and sometimes also by hearing a sermon. On such occasions, as on fast days in general, Mass also was celebrated in the evening, before the Vespers of the following day. Towards morning the people dispersed to the streets and houses near the church, to wait for the solemn services of the forenoon. This vigil was a regular institution of Christian life and was defended and highly recommended by St. Augustine and St. Jerome (see Pleithner, "Aeltere Geschichte des Breviergebetes", pp. 223 sq.).

The morning intermission gave rise to grave abuses; the people caroused and danced in the streets and halls around the church. St. Jerome speaks of these improprieties. [Think of what we see now with Mardi Gras before Lent begins!]

As the number of saints grew it became no longer possible to celebrate every saint on his or her particular day and in their particular area. In the fourth century, neighboring dioceses began to interchange feasts, to transfer relics, to divide them, and to join in a common feast; as is shown by the invitation of St. Basil of Caesarea (379) to the bishops of the province of Pontus. Frequently groups of martyrs suffered on the same day, which naturally led to a joint commemoration. In the persecution of Diocletian the number of martyrs became so great that a separate day could not be assigned to each. But The Church, feeling that every martyr should be venerated, appointed a common day for all. The first trace of this we find in Antioch on the Sunday after Pentecost. We also find mention of a common day in a sermon of St. Ephrem the Syrian (373), and in the 74th homily of St. John Chrysostom (407). At first only martyrs and St. John the Baptist were honored by a special day. Other saints were added gradually, and increased in number when a regular process of canonization was established; still, as early as 411 there is in the Chaldean calendar a "Commemoratio Confessorum" for the Friday after Easter.

In the West Boniface IV, 13 May, 609, or 610, consecrated the Pantheon in Rome to the Blessed Virgin and all the martyrs, ordering an anniversary. Gregory III (731-741) consecrated a chapel in the Basilica of St. Peter to all the saints and fixed the anniversary for 1 November. A basilica of the Apostles already existed in Rome, and its dedication was annually remembered on 1 May. Gregory IV (827-844) extended the celebration on 1 November to the entire Church. The vigil seems to have been held as early as the feast itself. The octave was added by Sixtus IV (1471-84).





2007: New York City. The journey of the statue of Our Lady of America began at the Basilica of St. Louis, King, in Saint Louis, Missouri on Saturday, September 8th. Concluding with Benediction offered by Fr. Elias Mary Mills, F.I., She immediately

began Her journey towards New York City. The statue was accepted from the volunteer cross-country driver into the care of firemen from the Jackson Mills Fire Department. In addition to other priests, the statue was blessed by Fr. Anthony Forte, of the Newark Diocese, and Chaplin of the Newark Fire Department. From there the journey into the World Trade Center neighborhood began in preparation for the 6th Anniversary of September 11, 2001.

While still in Her protective box, She was transported to the Holland Tunnel by the Jackson Mills N.J. Fire Department, where they were met by officials from the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey. She received a police escort through the Holland Tunnel and directly to the Church of St. Peter, one block from WTC – Ground Zero.

Statue escorts were from the Jackson Mills Fire Department, District 4; Raymond Tremor, Michael Ruggiero, Daniel Conte Raymond Tremor III and Stanley O'Brien Jr. From the Port Authority of NY and NJ, Patrolman Joseph Molina.

When thanked by volunteers of the Our Lady of America Center, Officer Joseph Molina said with a smile, "Anything for Mary!"

As the firemen carried Her up the stairs of the Church of St. Peter, Father Kevin Madigan, pastor, received Our Lady. Bystanders were watching the firemen carrying this precious statue, knowing something very significant was occurring.

The firemen were taken aback with excitement and wonder as they first laid eyes on Our Lady as the protective box was opened.

It was as though Our Lady was releasing Her graces for getting Her to

where Her Son is truly present for all Her children and especially for the families of those that had been taken in the 9-11 attacks.

As She was carried into the church, She seemed to come alive. It was the powerful, commanding and gentle movement of Her reaching Her beloved Son and Her earthly spouse St. Joseph at the front side Altar of the sanctuary.



Saint Josaphat Feast Day: November 12 Bishop and Martyr

Patron Saint of Ukraine:1580–1623 Invoked for the reunification of Eastern and Western Christians Canonized by Pope Pius IX on June 29, 1867

Quote: You people of Vitebsk want to put me to death. You make ambushes for me everywhere, in the streets, on the bridges, on the highways, and in the marketplace. I am here among you as a shepherd, and you ought to know that I would be happy to give my life for you. I am ready to die for the holy union, for the supremacy of Saint Peter, and of his successor the Supreme Pontiff. ~Saint Josaphat

After the Great Schism in 1054, many Christians in the Eastern (Byzantine) Empire separated from the pope, creating the Orthodox Church. Over the centuries, some Eastern Churches reunited with Rome, including the Ruthenian Orthodox Church. In the 1596 Union of Brest, the majority of Ruthenian Orthodox bishops professed obedience to the pope while keeping their Slavic liturgical traditions, celebrating the Byzantine Liturgy, retaining married priests, maintaining their own canon law and church governance, and holding onto some theological distinctions within the Creed. John Kuncevyc was born in Volodymyr, in the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth, today's Ukraine. Baptized into the Orthodox Church, he received a good education. He served at church services, loved Slavic religious traditions, embraced penance and mortification, and prayed the Divine Office.

In 1604, eight years after his local diocese reunited with Rome, John entered religious life as a monk at the Monastery of Holy Trinity of the Order of Saint Basil the Great in Vilnius. He

was given the religious name Josaphat. Ordained a Catholic priest in the Eastern Rite five years later, he remained at the monastery for the next eight years, becoming prior of his and several other monasteries.

Father Josaphat diligently studied Church history, the liturgy, and documents pertaining to Church unity. He continuously prayed the Jesus Prayer: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me." Some of his brother monks said that he could even be heard whispering it as he slept.

Father Josaphat's prayer and study led him to firmly support the Union of Brest, and he did all he could to convince others to embrace union with Rome. Many sought his spiritual advice, and he encouraged many young men to become monks. He was nicknamed "Soul-snatcher" for persuading Orthodox holdouts and Calvinists to embrace Catholicism.

In 1617, Father Josaphat was ordained as the Bishop of Vitebsk and was elevated to the Archbishopric of Polotsk one year later. In that important see [diocese], the faithful, monks, and clergy remained divided about reunification with Rome. As archbishop, he issued a catechism for the clergy to memorize. He imposed discipline for priestly living, had large meetings to discuss pastoral initiatives, renewed church buildings, and opposed everyone who opposed unification.

Within two years of Josaphat's ordination as archbishop, Ruthenian Orthodox factions that refused to unify with Rome

secretly gathered and ordained new Ruthenian Orthodox bishops, and an archbishop, setting up a second Church. The new Orthodox archbishop spread rumors that Josaphat planned to make the Church fully Latin, throwing out their Slavic traditions. Violence ensued, and even clergy battled clergy. In 1623, an

Orthodox priest led a revolt, with some lay support, against the archbishop. With stones and sticks, they broke into his house, cornered Josaphat, beat him, slit his head with an ax, shot him, dragged his naked dead body through town, and threw him into the Dvina River. His death inspired Ruthenian Catholics to solidify unification with Rome.
